



## Assessment

The Landis Center evaluates students' active citizenship development according to the following indicators:

- **Civic knowledge:** the ability to describe the social, political, and historical contexts of community organizations
- **Civic learning:** students' proficiency in transferring academic knowledge to the solution of a practical question.
- **Civic reflection:** students' capacity to retrospectively evaluate their reactions to their community engagement experiences
- **Civic Efficacy:** students' confidence in their ability to apply their skills and knowledge toward meaningful change in their communities

The following questions evaluate the indicators of active citizenship:
